
The **REDSIDE DACE** of the Morningside Tributary







REDSIDE DACE BIOLOGY

SCIENTIFIC NAME: *Clinostomus elongatus*. (Pronounced Cline-o-stow-mus e-long-gate-us). DISTRIBUTION: In Canada, only a few small populations in rivers and streams that flow into Lake Ontario.

HABITAT: Cool, clear streams with pools and rocks.


FOOD: Mainly surface insects.

STATUS: Vulnerable (low or declining populations)

BREEDING: May, when the water temperature rises to 16–19°C. At 2–3 years of age they spawn in or near the gravel nests of another minnow, the Creek chub, producing up to 1,500 eggs.

> MAXIMUM SIZE: 10 cm. Females are larger than the males.


The Morningside Tributary is a major branch of the Rouge River and the two rivers meet on Toronto Zoo property! This area has many different kinds of wild animals. Some of the animals that live here are hard to find in other areas of Ontario.

One of the rare animals found here is a fish called the **REDSIDE DACE.** This is an important area to the **REDSIDE DACE** and it should be taken care of and protected. Another fish called the Central stoneroller is at risk. Both fish species are considered "Vulnerable" by biologists.
